I am challenged by the biblical meaning of SHALOM, which signifies the dynamic action of restoring all things to their original integrity according to the intention of God and manifests itself in harmonious relationships with God, self, and all creation. My deep desire and prayer is to be faithful to God's work of SHALOM among us.

Solidarity with Southern Sudan by S. Cathy Arata, SSND

The unions of superiors general of women and men's religious congregations in Rome have responded to an invitation from the Southern Sudan Bishops' Conference to help rebuild the country and the Church after 21 years of civil war. More than 50 congregations, including SSND, have responded with a commitment of

personnel or financial donations. Specifically, the project aims to establish a teacher training program and a health care training program.



Sudan is Africa's largest country; Southern Sudan is the size of Germany and France together. Only about 7% of teachers in Southern Sudan have had any kind of teacher training. The illiteracy rate is almost 85%. Approximately 22% of the children attend school, with 2.3% completing primary schooling. There is one doctor for every 100,000 persons. Leprosy, blindness, polio, and malaria are widespread in Southern Sudan, where no more than 30–40 % of the people have access to a health center which many of them reach only after hours of walking.

Twenty-one members of the participating congregations will be ready to go to Southern Sudan within the next eighteen months to begin ministry in solidarity with the local Church.

SHALOM in the District of Latin America by S. Patricia Ferrick, SSND (LA)

The spirit and values of SHALOM are alive and well among the sisters in the District of Latin America. The SHALOM report at the June District Assembly highlighted numerous activities.



Puerto Rico: A commitment to and action on behalf of the environment have been encouraged among students through discussions of Al Gore's documentary on global warming; students from Perpetuo Socorro Academy went on a mission to Honduras; S. Socorro Rosario Rodriguez, SSND participated in a demonstration convoked by the bishops to protest the proposed new civil code; daily prayer for peace and cleaning the beach of debris are some of the activities of the Buen Pastor Home.

Paraguay: World Water Day, Earth Day, and Environment Day were commemorated with special prayer services; sisters and students participated in a march against poverty and hunger.

Chile: World Environment Day was marked by prayer for the protection of nature and an exhibition of drawings prepared by the "Missionary Children"; the campaign against the country's disastrous mining practices was promoted.

Peru: There is a growing consciousness of the care of water as well as progress in the campaign to turn off lights to save energy; In northern Peru, there are demonstrations against the cutting of trees to make coal; S. Regina Palacios, SSND works to assist women and the girl child in defending their of the rights particularly regarding acts of personal violation and violence.



Honduras: Workshops are held to empower women regarding their working rights; sisters and those with whom they work participated in a march against hunger in Opalaca; thousands of trees were planted by school children for World Environment Day.

Guatemala: The sisters have written and encouraged others to write to their senators and representatives in the USA urging immigration reform; the march against hunger was given special promotion by S. Janet Druffel, SSND Director of Radio Quiche.

More and more SHALOM is becoming a way of life for the sisters in the District and for the people with whom they minister.

60th Annual UN DPI/NGO Conference Focuses on Global Warming by S. Ann Scholz, SSND

Sisters Patricia Ferrick (LA), Barbara Frank (CA), Hanna Mignogno (AM), Kathleen Storms (MK), and Ann Scholz (UN Rep) will join more than 2,000 Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) and other civil society partners from 90 countries expected to attend the September 5-7 conference organized by the Department of Public Information (DPI) in collaboration with NGO/DPI Executive Committee.



The 60th Annual Conference will focus on action plans that address the growing concerns associated with climate change. The world is now equipped with a vast body of information, scientific as well as social and political, all pointing to the potential devastation of Earth. The conference will address solutions by helping participants to develop concrete practices that can be implemented and shared. The goal of this conference is to build knowledge of climate change into the viable habits of everyday practice that ensure a better future.

The conference will also highlight the interconnection between climate change and the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). As conference organizers stated, “There will be no sustainable improvement in the environment without addressing the root causes of poverty and the necessity of basic education.”

Commission for Social Development (CSocD) February 6-15, 2008 The Commission is concerned with issues related to the well-being of all and to the promotion of people-centered development. The 46th Session of the Commission will focus on full employment and decent work for all.

Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) February 25-March 7, 2008 CSW is dedicated exclusively to gender equality and the advancement of women. The 52nd Session of the CSW will focus on financing for gender equality and the empowerment of women. This year the SSND delegation will include young women from sponsored colleges.

Commission on Sustainable Development (CSD) May 5-16, 2008 CSD promotes dialogue, elaborates policy options, and builds partnerships for sustainable development with governments and the international community. CSD-16 will focus on agriculture, rural development, land, drought, desertification, and Africa.

Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues (PFII) April 21-May 2, 2008 The Permanent Forum is an advisory body to ECOSOC with a mandate to discuss indigenous issues related to economic and social development, culture, the environment, education, health and human rights. Its 7th

Session will consider the stewardship role of indigenous peoples in climate change, bio-cultural diversity, livelihoods, and implementation of the Millennium Development Goals.

Stand Up and Speak Out against Poverty and for the MDGs, October 17, 2007 by S. Ann Scholz, SSND, UN-NGO Director

Join millions of people from around the world and [Stand Up and Speak Out](#) against poverty and inequality and for the accomplishment of the Millennium Development Goals.



In 2000, leaders from 189 countries endorsed the [Millennium Development Goals](#) (MDG), a global plan to halve extreme poverty, guarantee human rights, and establish good governance by 2015.

The year 2007 marks the midway point for attaining the MDGs.. While no one goal is projected to be on track across all regions and progress in sub-Saharan Africa needs to accelerate across the board to meet the 2015 targets, there have been impressive indicators of progress since 2000.

The [Millennium Development Goals Report 2007](#) affirms that the world is on track to meet the target of halving the percent of the world's population living on less than US\$1.00 day. Primary school enrollment increased from 80% in 1990 to 88% in 2005. In Sub-Saharan Africa measles vaccination coverage went from 49% in 2000 to 64% in 2005. The number of people on antiretroviral treatment for HIV/AIDS spiked from about 50,000 in 2003 to over 2 million in December 2006.

The 2007 MDG progress report indicates that developing countries are taking their MDG obligations seriously and are starting to reap rewards from their effort. Given the significant progress between 2000 and 2005, it is especially disappointing that rich countries are largely failing to live up to their end of the MDG deal.

This year, join the growing movement of people calling on world leaders to take action now. On October 17, 2007 Stand Up and Speak Out!
